# **EDITORIAL**

Welcome to the first edition of the Magic Lantern Society's new publication, The Magic Lantern, under the joint editorship of Gwen Sebus and Jeremy Brooker. With the growing popularity of our website and Twitter account, and the monthly e-letter 'New Light on Old Media', many aspects of the former Newsletter have been taken over by other means. It has therefore been decided that we focus all our energies on producing a single high-quality periodical, issued four times a year and in full colour. This remains first and foremost a publication aimed at Society members, but it is intended that after a period of perhaps one year past issues will be made available online. This will increase the circulation of our articles, furthering the wider aims of the Society and raising our profile amongst researchers and possible future members. It will also make publication by the Society more attractive to potential contributors, whose work will gain a larger audience, and so help us to maintain our reputation for original research of the highest quality.

Past readers will see much that is familiar from the former Journal and Newsletter: a scholarly article from Society member Bernd Scholtze on German toy lanterns (an aspect of lantern history unfamiliar to most members), a further look at some forgotten manufacturers of comic slipping slides from Lester Smith, meeting reports, and book reviews for Screen Culture and the Social Question and Before the Movies, and of course the usual welcome to new members and other Society announcements. There are also some new elements. First, there is the splendid design and new masthead from our own Dennis Crompton, whose expertise has done so much to enhance the reputation of the Society over many years. There is also one conspicuous new feature: 'Prominent Magic Lanternists', the first in a proposed series of in-depth interviews with leading figures in the lantern world. The magic lantern is historically important and the artefacts (slides, projectors etc.) are sometimes beautiful works of art in their own right, but this has always been and remains a performance medium. Lantern slides only come to life when viewed on a large screen, in darkness, with an audience; and in these conditions (with the performers all but invisible) the role of showmen and women is of paramount importance. We are particularly fortunate to have secured a delightful and insightful interview with Terry Borton, luminary amongst American magic lantern performers and well known as a member of both our own and the American and Canadian societies. We hope you will enjoy this first issue, and share our excitement at the prospect of many further editions in the years to come.

from 17 October 2014 to 25 September 2015. See www.museedemontmartre.fr/expositions-temporaires.


